## Bureau of Meteorology

"Some notes on draught in Aust."

by W. J. Gibbs & J. V. Maher.

1837-38. One of the worst draughts known. Murrumbidgee ceased to flow, the Murray was almost dry. Lake George was dry for 10 yrs.

1845 Stuart reported that the Darling had ceased to flow

1846-47. Draught very severe in NSW.

1857-59 Draught yrs in NSW. In some areas nothing like it occurred again until 1900.

1863-65. Very severe draught years in many parts of NSW.

1877-1878. Draught more severe in northern districts, but shorter less severe, less widespread than some of great draughts.

1884-1885. Worst draught since 1837-38 acc. to press reports

1888 - Short severe drought but  
was described as the driest year  
on record for NSW as a whole.  
Many sheep, cattle lost & average  
wheat yield for 1888-89 was  
4.8 bushels per acre.

1895-1903. Worst drought in Hist.  
of NSW. Culminated in record  
severe drought conditions in  
1901-1902 & into 1903 in some  
areas. 1903 av wheat 1.2 bush.  
per acre. Sheep pop<sup>n</sup> dropped  
from 4.2 million in 1901 to 2.7 mill  
in 1902.

1904-1910. - Prolonged dry with  
some severe drought extended  
to Nov 1910 on South Coast  
to Aug 1909 on North Coast.

This is the highest flood on record

Mr A Cornwall - very old resident.  
'No-one ever knew a flood so  
high as the great one of 1867. It  
then came 15' over the floor of my  
house which is a spot that had  
never <sup>been</sup> known to be flooded before.

Would have covered the  
highest spot in the town of Richmond  
1870 general floods.

1874. Hunter came down in high  
flood 33'9" inundated to Matland  
Peel River rose to a great height  
at Gannon Gannon the highest  
floods since 1864.

1875. March. Hawkesbury & Hefean  
overflowed banks. considerable  
area near Richmond. Murrumbidgee  
was submerged.

1878. Peel. Gannon Gannon Creek high.

June -  
1891 - Qereanbeyan in flood - nothing  
like it in memory of the oldest  
inhabitants - water over bridge,  
houses swept away.

School - Mother started school at Neville. Uncle Joe her teacher. Once there was a mistake about who had their sum right. Joe changed the mark on the blackboard.

Teacher was Mr Blackler. He'd pick up a dropped handkerchief on the end of his cane. say, "Has anyone lost a 'snoof tuck'". Uncle Joe died when he was 22.

Again M. said he taught at Rylstone. - referred to damp sheets.

At Neville there was a large tree called a pear-apple.

Fruit trees in orchard  
black heart, & white heart  
cherries.

Food - Ate a lot of potatoes. Once when parents away Lil was in charge. The entire meal was

potatoes cooked in every way  
baked, boiled etc. children  
enjoyed them. Tomatoes a novelty.  
lytaldma. Always happy.  
loved her 9 boys. enjoyed  
gardening couldn't bend  
much but used a Dutch hoe.  
gave all the children the  
chance of a patch of their own.  
Had a musk rose with a  
beautiful perfume.

Always a lot of men at  
the long table. - liked boys to  
be at home. Ambrose Rodlum.  
(on map of Nerulle) Knew names  
on map. No one swamp.

Mother made clothes on a  
little chain stitch machine  
Kilcox & Gible. Singer agent  
came "you don't call that  
a machine!"

Grandmother died when she was 70. Comment about the house they'd moved to. Path too narrow to carry a coffin with 2 lots of beavers. She was the first to go.

Wellington - East Lynne on road to caves.

She knew South Creek was at St Marys.

So we were related to quality!

Aunt Lil meal of potatoes cooked different ways. Parents away.

Mother a good cook. Lil took after her. Remember scent of the round loaves of fresh bread turned out to cool. Father made a brick oven for the bread.

## Helston a Coinage Town

Medieval Kings & earls controlled industry -

To facilitate collection of dues on tin metal melted into blocks & stamped with duchy arms. Coinage towns 5 mentioned in Charter of King Edward I 1305 Lostwithiel, Bodmin, Liskeard, Truro & Helston.

Discontinued in 1837. Twice a year  
Midsummer & Michaelmas

100 mines worked in Helston district -

Mostly tin but several had copper at a lower level

Also a few lead mines  
one rich in silver.

30<sup>th</sup> June '76 Allan made a visit &  
found Mother very chatty.  
Move to Wellington - jock  
waiting - brought 'Libby the Cat'  
Couldn't remember her M. doing  
housework - she concentrated  
on the cooking [ Maybe in the  
boarding house days ]

Lil went to Bathurst to cook  
for Anne & Uncle Billy - they had  
a shop. sometimes she handed  
out the sweets.

Bathurst was the first place  
she associated with train  
smoke.

Asked grandmother for Lil  
because she had other daughters  
to help her.

2<sup>nd</sup> Nov<sup>'76</sup> crawling along with her  
frame. "Out of my way. Here  
comes the galloping major".
