Dear Mrs. Hohnen,

I reply at once to your letter of 20th August because I am concerned that your previous letter and contents must have gone astray. I certainly don't have a Feb. letter from you on the file and had I received money I should have acknowledged even if I could not carry out your requests. The request for a photograph would certainly have interested me and I have no recollection whatever of reference to Robert Cock, Mayor of Helston. Too much money has gone astray this past year for my liking, and we no longer send cash overseas to S.Africa because three letters at least have never reached there and probably others where we have received no acknowledgment of birthday presents to our grandchildren. We did not think anything of that previously because children always need pressure to write letters, but when we were there at Christmas we couldn't think why we had no card or letter from our younger son and when we arrived home he said he had sent ~~RR30~~ and a card in good time and since returning I sent a R10 note in May for a birthday and a test case of a R2 note following that, neither of which arrived. I haven't had any currency from the States for a long time so can't say whether or not that gets through and usually English currency is by cheque. I was not so surprised about SA but there must be some way of knowing money is contained in a letter and it could be that there is a metal line in banknotes that show up on the sort of machine that picks up metal when one goes through at the airport. I didn't really think about the possibility of interception until it became so apparent with the S.A. letters. I am terribly sorry about your £20 note. Was it for work to be done or payment for something I had done? I haven't stopped to find your file, because I wanted to catch the next post after receiving your letter. We did not return until the end of January, whereupon I caught flu and did not really surface until February, when I got down to replying to all the mail that was awaiting us. If you didn't write until February, then that would have automatically ~~have~~ been acknowledged. I have certainly been in correspondence with Mrs. Pat Lay. Any way, please do not worry about the loss of the money - I am not bothered if it was in payment for work done, but if for requested work, then let me know what you want and I will see what I can do for you. I have cut back a great deal on what I do and the CRO closes on Nov. 1 for several months for repairs. I tried to get a quick appointment there earlier in the week, now that our various grandchildren who have been staying have gone home, but they couldn't give me one for two weeks. We go away ourselves in September for a much needed holiday after a very hot summer - as hot as we experienced in S.A. I much prefer spring and autumn, the heat takes away all my energy, and winter is a challenge. I suppose I am bound to slow up a bit having passed my 68th birthday!

At one time when we were in S.A. we thought our family there might have been moving to Perth, and that we might be having a holiday out there, but they are still near Capetown and don't know where their next move will be. They sold their house preparatory to a move and are in a small rented flat. They were in Perth for a while a few years back and thought it a beautiful city.

From my using my private address you might rightly infer that I have 'retired': however, I still pick up genealogical enquiries and, from your letter, I see that we have corresponded before

From the Cornwall Family History Society's Directory of Members' Interests, I see that several members are researching the name Cocks, but not one of them in the bigard area. The surname is wide-spread and there are several alternative suggestions as to its origin. The most widely-held theory is that it is what is called a pet or affectionate diminutive, also used in Wilcock, to denote a pert, strutting, sure-of-himself boy. Indeed 'cock' is still commonly used in addressing someone rather familiarly - as in 'wotcher cock'!

The Welsh and Cornish have a word 'coch' which signifies 'red', so it is conceivable that a man with red hair or complexion, perhaps of a fiery temper, might be called Coch in the same way that a Viking was styled 'Eric the Red'.

This means, of course, that not all Cocks descend from

a common ancestor.

Making a reservation at the County Record Office, County Hall, Inver, can be done by post or by phone (0872 73698): even in the newly-extended premises, space is often at a premium.

You ask if there are records of schools - certainly not in the 18th century when educational facilities in country areas were minimal, if they existed at all. There would have been the equivalent of the 19th century dame schools where a man or woman would have taught the three R's, the pupils contributing their pence. Sometimes there was a parish school created by private charity.

You can judge the state of agriculture in a book written in 1811 under the name of G.B. Wotgan. From that you will see that improvements were then being introduced. On the Lizard farming would have been very much on a subsistence level: fishing would have been equally important to a coastal parish. Land and seaweed would have been basic manures.

If you want to look into Nicholls, Phillips and Mundy you would do well to book time on the microfiche reader at the Museum.

Thank you for your prompt reply to my enquiry. You realize of course I am Australian residing in France for a limited period. I had hoped that during this visit to France, while touring in Brittany, we might cross from Roscoff to Cornwall as we did some years ago, but it now seems unlikely.

Your quotation of the Marriage Settlement was interesting reading. It was all spelt out - Chapter. Verse - but I think the participant could possibly have been an Uncle of Peter Cock of St Keverne who was baptised 1753 in March, and in April 1753 his father ROBERT COCK died (husband of Rhadegund or Radeqund who died in St Keverne 1790+.

[I haven't my full records with me as I explained

2. Peter Cock of St Keverne d. 1826.

Peter married twice

(1) Ann Rogers who died 1791 - having lost 3 infants
3. Their daughter Elizabeth married John Smith also of St Keverne 'Irishman' c 1806
Their son John Smith migrated to Australia in the 1830s & eventually prospered, was active in breeding merinos & became an M.H.C in N.S.W.

Is there any record of that marriage settlement?

I am not returning your £20 because I am insulted at being offered money - but because it seems over. payment for a little expertise and my duties do not allow me to undertake more detailed research - much as I would like to do so.

I can offer you one firm piece of information. Robert Cook of Constantine was married to Redagon Nichols at St Anthony in Meneage on December 31st 1741. I will bear your problem in mind in the hope that I shall be able to find some time for your problem. In the meantime, if you want a genuine researcher I can recommend Mrs B. Farrell of 2, Florence Terrace, Falmouth.

As Keveve is unique in having 'turns': they come about because the parish is very large and conveniently divided for administrative purposes

Turn Bean on NE: 'bean' = 'vean' = little

Turn Iaboe NW.

Turn Irelan SW

Turn Iregan E

} all four meet at the church but Churchtown (ie. the area around the church) was not a turn.

The origin of the word is obscure but I recall how relatives used to say "I'm taking a turn down the street", in much the same sense.

Dear Mrs Hohnen,

Although genealogical enquiries are far from being novelties, it is unusual to receive one from France, so one might the more wish to be of help.

When Peter Cock was described on his tomb-stone as "reputable yeoman", I wonder if that was an echo of the family's diminishing status. In our collection (U/15/16) there is a marriage settlement dated November 23rd 1741 when Humphrey Harvey and Elizabeth daughter of Peter Cock of Constantine were coming together

The parties were :-

- ① Henry HARVEY of Wendron yeoman
 - ② Thomas HARRIS of Illogan gent
 - ③ Humphrey HARVEY son and heir of ①
- ① conveyed to ② for the use of ③, upon his marriage, the estate of Irelill in Wendron

subject to payment of an annuity to Henry's wife Amy. After the marriage Humphrey and his wife "to be admitted into possession of the old mansion house now upon the said tenement of Irelill for himself and family to live in, together with a proportionate part of the Town place there, and shall also have the parlour chamber in the said dwelling-house furnished with bedding and other convenient household goods of the said

Mary Harvey the father, and shall likewise be admitted to keep one horse with and amongst the horses of his father -- and Henry Harvey doth promise, covenant and agree to give and provide for his said son Humphrey Harvey and his said intended wife and their family meat, drink and such like dyett as shall be used and expended in and amongst the family of him the said Henry Harvey for and during the term of two years next to come after the solemnisation of the said intended marriage" (and at the end of the term) "to find and provide wheat and barley-corn for him the said Humphrey Harvey sufficient to be expended in and about his family" (and to keep two cows amongst his father's on Lelill). (Upon his father's death, Humphrey, was to meet his legacies to his mother, brothers and sisters).

I am tempted to think that Peter was probably descended from the Cocks of Helston who appear as Mr (s) and gents in the parish registers. For this family the following wills are at the County Record Office

- William C. of Helston 1704
- Francis C - 1709
- John C - 1728
- John C - 1741
- Francis C - 1754
- Peter C of Constantine 1755
- Honour C of Helston 1762
- Elizabeth C " 1776

One or more of these might well give you both a link and a clue.

Your address was given me by a fellow Australian, Miss Angela Broome who like myself has been doing genealogical research into Cornish forbears.

My mother's paternal forbears were named Cock and three generations were associated with the Parish of St Keverne, where they farmed a property called "Lesneague" part of "Llanarthistate". Peter Cock's headstone is in the graveyard of the Parish Church, & gives the date of his death as 3rd Dec 1826 aged 75 yrs. The first mention of the name in "Tythe" books appears to have been 4th April, 1768, paid by Mrs Cock when Peter was about 17 yrs old.

His first wife Ann Rogers died following childbirth in 11th May, 1791 aged 31 yrs and three of their children died in infancy. Peter re-married Mary Munday and their eldest son Robert born in 1796 was my great grandfather. He farmed "Lesneague" until the harvest of 1848. About that time a daughter was born at Crowan & I have mention of Leedstown in an old letter which gives the impression that they may have been staying with relatives [Robert's wife was Catherine Phillips]. In the 1851 their names appear in the Census in the parish of Altermun at a farm of 80 acres called "Newhey". A couple of years later, Robert Cock & his wife Catherine migrated to Australia, but I have not as yet discovered the precise date.

Returning to Peter Cock who is described as a "reputable yeoman", I found records of a Peter Cock, son of Robert and Rhadegund, christened at Constantine 12th March, 1753, and an older brother Robert

christened at Constantine 25th July 1747. The death of Robert Cock Senr, husband of Rhadegund occurred not long after Peter's death. My assumption is that the union moved to 'Lesneague' in 1768. There is the death of a Rhadegund at St Keverne some years later and it appears to be an unusual name in the Parish lists. [Here in France, where we are making an extended visit, I find Rhadegund was a queen and patron saint of Poitiers.]

Years ago when visiting Cornwall I read a book about the History of Helston by Spencer Jay where there was mention of a Robert Cock, Mayor of Helston 1684. Is there any record of his family available. From this register, I wonder could you direct my inquiries in any direction which would add to my information and what search fees would be expected. I have been in touch some years ago with the Registry Office in Exeter. What schooling would have been available

I am most grateful for the details you supplied about "Lesneague". My interest is merely poring out some particulars about Cornish forebears who came from St Keverne. My mother who is 92 is the last survivor of a family of 13. Her father Edwin Cook was married in Australia in 1863 but must have migrated some ten years earlier. His father Robert Peter must have brought his nine children to Australia. His daughter Mary married a Hill, so there may be some link there. Grandfather referred to his old home as "Lesneague". Twenty years ago I was in correspondence with Mr Lambidge - not Lambuck who grew up on that farm. His grandfather moved to "Lesneague" in 1862 and the family lived there until 1935. He had very happy memories of his childhood there & sent me a photograph.

Another Cornishman who came to Australia in 1836 and became a member of the legislative council was John Smith. His father John Smith came from "Treharwan" (1781-1840). His mother was Elizabeth Cook (1786-1853) daughter of Peter & Ann Cook of Lesneague. Peter was born 1751 — 1826 (died)

Ann " " 1760 — 1791

From copies of Parish registers I learned that Peter re-married Mary Mundy 1791 and their son Robert Peter was born & baptized 1796. He was my great grandfather and lived in Australia for 30 years before he died. Can you find any reference to Peter or Robert Peter Cook? Someone has prepared extensive family trees of the John Smith family. My mother always refers to him as the "John" whose eventual home

Dear Mrs Hohnen,

Thank you for your letter which reached me safely. I moved from Florence Terrace in May 1987 to a small flat in Falmouth but felt too restricted so in August last year, moved again, into the Courtye. I have a large mobile home in a very nice setting with quite a large garden.

I am enclosing cuttings from the old Telephone directory, which gives quite a good selection of property for summer letting but I don't think it will be easy in the middle of the holiday season. I always hesitate to recommend anywhere because on the occasions I have ventured to do so in the past, it has not been very successful. What suits one person is not always attractive to others. I have a friend who has taken a flat for several years at Swanpool in Falmouth but I know they
