I am going to submit a newspaper cutting for the "Lady McNaughton" calling it "the bride ship that reeked of death etc." It would be a good opportunity to write something about the cock family arrival 1854 in case someone else has come across their name on a shipping document somewhere. Entries/articles etc are to be submitted by 15th February (see pg. 154 'Timespan')

Are you going to publish a book on your findings about the cock family? You should! Your writing style is excellent and your research so thorough. You would have some customers here in Sydney. I have another cousin now who is very interested and my mother reads everything you send me. I dread anything with the name mentioned - I wrote to a Mr & Mrs Thomas from Cornwall who registered their interest in the name, but the letter was returned unopened.

The letter you wrote of in your last letter sounds very interesting dated 1855 (re. the family going through a bad time). Could I possibly have a copy of it to read. I will not be at all offended if the answer is No; I appreciate

that I am only a beginner in Family History
& the hours & hours of research in money & time
that you have spent make people's requests of
you difficult, because reciprocation is rare.

I have acquired a copy of "Quench Not The
Spirit" thanks to your recommendation

I have just been handed an article /sheath
of papers ^{by you} headed the "Coch Family" sent to
E. Lindsay for Tomcsparr / Library inclusion which
also mentions another letter 30.1.1868 headed South
Creek from Robert Coch to Edwin. Could I also
see a copy of it? again, no offence intended; or
Lahew if the answer is no.

Next week (after 7th Jan) I am going to Sydney
to the Archives & the Land Office. I will get a
map re. Fleurs owners 1860's (that is the owner
after Richard Jones, is that correct?) Please
ring me (047 512859) if there is any more information
I should need, or should ask for or find out
in Sydney. Perhaps this is somehow I can help
you. Garry is going to mind the children.
I shall have all day to search.

I enclose your letter from Eugenie Stapleton. It is a very interesting letter but I dispute a few of her facts, primarily current ownership & facts re. the original grant.

I found last time I was at the Archives a shipping record. You may have already seen it & discounted its relevance for us but here it is anyway:—

15.9.1853 Bargae "Kinnar" from London, Tonnage 368. Sailed 14.4.1853 laden with merchandise. Agent R. Towers.

Mr & Mrs COCK

(2) Misses COCK

Mr. G. A. COCK

Master. C? F. O. Cock.

Steerage

The Honorable - The Colonial Secretary

Please let me know if it has any special relevance, and I'll send the original document(copy).

My COCK research is in a lull just now as I've set up a Trove ONE NAME GROUP world wide , with over 280 family groups thus far (I've sent 280 letters - must be mad !) But the response is fantastic. I'm now a member of C.F.H.S, I joined in February but the journals etc have just arrived this week. I've done a little work on the ROBENS line (named ROBINS in your screed or that from Grace Scott)—the line descends from Stephen ROBENS, missions of the Methodist Church & the original instigator of the City Mission in Sydney who are publishing later this year, using a great deal of information on Stephen. Stephen was the father of Thomas Robens, who in turn was the father of Violet Robens who married George Herbert COCK.
